The building itself is contemporary and situated in the part of the Boston waterfront created by the big dig. The area around it has many boutique shops and restaurants.

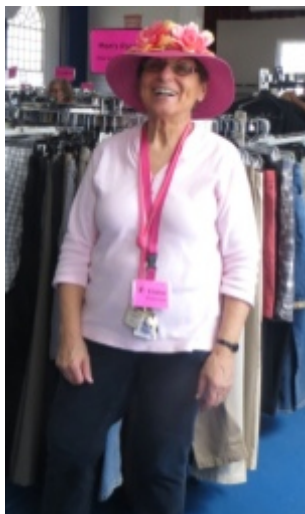
make reservations for lunch so you can be assured of being seated. After lunch you are on your own until we board the bus at 3 PM.

Pre-Consignment and Consignment CLOTHING LIMITS CUT 20%

Due to the growing number of consignors and the total items consigned, we have outgrown available retail space at Tracy Hall; lower level of the building is not available for expansion. Each sale has seen an increase in the number of consignors; the number of consignors has doubled over the past two years. The 100/50 item limits were instituted long ago in the previous century! The new pre-consignment limit is 80 items per pre-consignment number and consignors now have a 40-item limit.

Clothing Donations

We are no longer accepting donations at Tracy Hall. Priscilla Vincent, Annette Brown and Elaine Waterman will inspect donations **by appointment only** on the following dates prior the fall sale window: October 6th and 7th from 1-5:30 pm and October 8th from 2 – 6 pm. Donation inspection will take place at Elaine's house just down the street from Tracy Hall on Church Street; easy access and parking. Anyone wishing to donate clothing will need to call Elaine at (802) 649-1558 for an appointment. This will make donating clothing easier for the donor and those waiting in line with their inspection number as donation inspection has always taken priority. Donation certificates will be available.

Fall 2016 Digital Consignment Update

The digital team feels we are not yet ready to go public for the fall sale. We are inviting 25 pre-consignors who regularly consign up to the maximum

consignors for the fall sale.

Our goal is to open up pre-consignment on line for the Spring 2017 Sale.

Inspection Area Upgrade

We will be re-arranging the location of the inspection tables to make use of natural light and electric outlets for day-bright lighting. Many items have passed inspection that shouldn't have due to the poor lighting available in Tracy Hall.

FROM THE HISTORIAN

When we're in the midst of doing the work, we don't always recognize how much the women of Norwich accomplish, banded together as the Norwich Women's Club. In my role as historian, I gather annual statistics to document NWC activities. Stepping back from the numbers, all I can say is, "Whew!" This past year has been incredible.

With a working board of about 20 and a town-wide membership of over 260, the group touches lives and programs throughout the community. The club's mission has always been to "promote and support the cultural, educational, civic and charitable aspects of life in Norwich," and we love doing just that.

Last year alone, using funds raised by its annual Spring Gala, the NWC distributed over \$30,000 in support of community initiatives sponsored by Revels North, Aging in Place, Good Beginnings and including the Hanover High Graduation Party. In addition, the NWC has helped fund programs hosted by the Norwich Public Library, Marion Cross School, the Norwich Recreation Department, and the Family Place, to name a few.

Revenue from our two Nearly New Sales (which involve over 240 volunteers), combined with donations and dues, made it possible for the Club to contribute \$36,000 in local

We take our role as community educators seriously too. We produce the Norwich Town Phone Directory and a number of club newsletters, in addition to hosting various Voter Information Sessions for community members to meet candidates for local offices and make informed decisions.

But we're not just **fund**-raisers---we're **fun**-raisers too. Ask any one of the 200 people who attend our Spring Gala, or those who come to our Fall Gathering, enjoy our Holiday Party, or picnic on the Green while listening to our summer concerts. Talk to the hundred or so people who have taken advantage of our signature programs such as Coffee and Conversations or the Book and Author luncheons held at the Norwich Inn, or participated in trips to local and regional museums. Listen to the compliments that the Norwich Town Garden generates each year. The garden is maintained by Club members and was identified as one of our area's summer jewels by Terry Tempest Williams, a guest of the Norwich Bookstore this past summer.

Yes, we have had a busy and rewarding year, and it's easy to see why we draw our membership not just from Norwich but also from 14 surrounding towns. Since 1907 when the club was first created, the NWC has been a local treasure for the entire Norwich community, and the members today carry on its tradition of service with joy, pride and a healthy dose of laughter.
