## **Norwich Women's Club Newsletter Member Profile**

### **ANNE DAY**



The words that come to mind when thinking about Anne Day are **confidence, competence, and commitment.**

Anne grew up in New Canaan, Connecticut, a small bedroom town not far from Manhattan. From there she went to Williams College in Williamstown in western Massachusetts, graduating in 1983.

After several short jobs in Boston, her life took a different tack. Michael Dukakis was looking to become the Democratic nominee for President. Anne moved to Iowa for nine months and worked in various primaries spanning six states; Iowa, New Hampshire, Vermont, Michigan, Nebraska and California. During the convention she was a delegate tracker for the California delegation, working to be certain that the delegates voted correctly. She must have

impressed everyone because after the convention she went on to Oregon as the State Director of the Dukakis campaign. She proudly boasts that Dukakis won Oregon, the first presidential Democratic victory there since 1964!

After the election she returned to Massachusetts to work for state government. She describes herself as a policy person and became frustrated when policy initiatives she helped craft were rejected by the traditionalists in the state legal department. This frustration led her to Boston University Law School in 1989 where she hoped that credentials as a lawyer would allow her to be a more effective advocate.

In the fall of her third year, she landed a job at a large prestigious San Francisco law firm doing environmental regulatory and litigation work. Part of the deal she negotiated for herself was a delayed start so that she could be the Michigan statewide field director for Clinton's campaign.

After the election she returned to San Francisco for a few years before joining a boutique law firm in Sacramento where she concentrated on water law. She originally met her husband, Alex Rimberg, while on the east coast, and then met him again at a wedding in Maryland, and they both ended up in the Bay area in 1992. As she put it, they had three meetings over five years on two different coasts. They married in 1995 and in 1996 moved to Houston when Alex got a job at Rice University. Anne went to work in the City of Houston legal department doing environmental regulatory law. *(Now that she was a lawyer she didn't have to worry about being overruled by the city's legal staff.)*

Her first son Wilson, now 14, was born in Houston. When Jacob, now 10, was 2 months old, Alex was hired by Dartmouth. Anne tells of having to find a house, manage the move, and care for her newborn infant, as well as 4-year-old Wilson. She looked at six houses, chose the best of the six, and the family moved to Norwich. She thought that it would be a temporary house but they lived there for nine years, only recently moving to a new house on Upper Pasture Road.

When she first moved to Norwich she did some part-time work for Hershenson, Carter, Scott & McGee. She became involved in the PTO, served on the School Committee for five years, two years as Chair of the Norwich School Board and one year as Chair of the SAU Board. She was on the Search Committee for the new superintendent and chaired the Search Committee that hired Bill Hammond. She chose not to run again this year so that she could spend more time with her family.

When considering small town life, she observed that life in Norwich is very different than small town life in Texas. Although her friends have often commented on the lack of diversity in Vermont, she observed that multi-cultural cities are socially stratified. While people might see more diversity out on the street, they tend to socialize only with people of their own class. The difference in the Upper Valley is that social stratification is less of an issue. She appreciates the natural beauty of the area as well as the generosity of the community.

In her spare time, she plays the piano. When we met, I admired the beautiful sweater she was wearing and learned that she is a knitter as well.

It will be interesting to see what Anne decides to do in the next stage of her life. There is no doubt that she will take on new challenges. We are lucky that she and Alex decided to settle in Norwich.

## La Joie du Chocolat

### Cake

5 1/2 oz butter

1 1/4 c sugar

3/4 c cocoa powder

1/4 t salt

1 t vanilla extract

1 T Chambord

2 lge eggs

1/2 c all purpose flour

1. Cream the butter, sugar, salt, vanilla and Chambord.
2. Add cocoa to the creamed mixture.
3. Add eggs one at a time.
4. Spoon the mixture until it fills 2/3 of a 6oz-baking cup. (Silicone is great for this.)
5. Bake at 325 degrees for 10-15 minutes.
6. Push a sizable piece of ganache into the center of each cake and bake an additional 1 -2minutes.

To serve, spoon some coulis is a pretty pattern on plate. Set warm chocolate cake in the center of it and top with cream. (sour cream topping will not melt) Yum.



### Ganache

2/3 c bittersweet chocolate

1/2 c heavy cream

Melt chocolate into cream. Cool in refrigerator until solid.

### Coulis

Combine frozen raspberries, a little water, turbinado sugar and Malbec in a saucepan until it has cooked down a bit. Put in blender and mix.

### Topping

Combine sour cream with a bit of vanilla extract and sugar. Blend. And add a bit of lemon zest

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## FOR SPRING TIME....

### Chocolate Chunk Macaroons,

from The Best of Martha Stewart Living "Desserts"

$\frac{3}{4}$  cup sugar

2  $\frac{1}{2}$  cups unsweetened shredded coconut

2 large egg whites (I sometimes use the cartons of egg whites from the supermarket)

$\frac{1}{2}$  cup semi sweet chocolate chunks (about 3 ozs.)

1 tsp pure vanilla extract

pinch of salt

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Line a baking sheet with parchment paper.

In a large bowl, combine all the ingredients. Using your hands, mix well to completely combine.

Dampen hands with cold water. Form 1  $\frac{1}{2}$  TBL of mixture into a loose haystack shape, place on prepared baking sheet. Repeat with remaining mixture, spacing about 1" apart. I use an ice cream scoop that's about 1  $\frac{1}{2}$  TBS and it works great.

Bake until golden brown, about 15-20 minutes. Transfer baking sheet to a wire rack to cool. Leave in a warm place 1 hour, allowing chocolate to soften. Store in an airtight container up to 3 days.

I typically make this in double batches, and bake both baking sheets at a time, switching half way through the baking time. Depending on how tightly I fill the ice cream scoop I get 20-24 cookies per recipe, which all can fit on one baking sheet.
